
holding a conversation, vacate and move to boy B, C, D, and even E (if needed)! If you get past boy E, vacate all prior advice and wait until next year to try again!








Motivation, Dating, and Fear

APPLE - DOWN THE DESTRUCTION OF HUMANITY



TOP 10 THINGS NOT TO SAY ON A DATE ...


